Brian T. Moynihan is the president of Consumer and Small Business Banking for Bank of America. On December 16, 2009, Bank of America announced that Moynihan would succeed Ken Lewis as Chief Executive Officer and President, Bank of America, effective January 1, 2010. Moynihan will also be a member of the Bank of America Board of Directors.
