

HENRY A. NASRALLAH, M.D.

Henry A. Nasrallah, M.D., is a professor of psychiatry and neuroscience and director of the Schizophrenia Research Program at the University of Cincinnati College of Medicine.

Dr. Nasrallah has been the editor-in-chief of the international peer-reviewed journal *Schizophrenia Research* for 18 years. He is also the editor-in-chief of two other journals: *Current Psychiatry* and *The Journal of Psychotic Disorders*. He has received numerous teaching and research awards and has served as president of several professional organizations. He has been listed in multiple editions of the book "*Best Doctors in America*."

Dr. Nasrallah has received more than 60 federal, state, industry and private foundation grants and has published more than 300 peer-reviewed articles and 10 books in the areas of neurobiology and psychopharmacology of schizophrenia, bipolar disorder and related psychotic disorders. He is board certified in adult as well as geriatric psychiatry.

Dr. Nasrallah received his B.S. and M.D. degrees from the LCME accredited American University of Beirut School of Medicine. He completed his psychiatric residency training at the University of Rochester, New York, followed by a neuroscience research fellowship at the National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH). He served as an assistant professor at the University of California, San Diego (UCSD), as well as associate professor and professor at the University of Iowa, before serving as professor and chairman of the Department of Psychiatry at the Ohio State University for 12 years. Following a research sabbatical during which he co-founded and co-directed the VISN 16 MIRECC (center grant), he joined the University of Cincinnati as associate dean and professor of psychiatry, neurology and neuroscience in January 2003.

HERBERT MELTZER, M.D.

Herbert Meltzer, M.D., is the Bixler/May/Johnson professor of psychiatry and pharmacology and director of the Psychobiology Program for Translational Research at the Vanderbilt University School of Medicine, in Nashville, Tennessee. He is also director of the Schizophrenia Program of Centerstone Mental Health System in Nashville and chair of the Young Investigator Grant Review Committee for the National Alliance for Research on Schizophrenia and Depression (NARSAD). He is chairman of the International Psychopharmacology Algorithm Project (www.IPAP.org).

Dr. Meltzer received his B.A. from Cornell University, an M.A. in Chemistry from Harvard University and his M.D. from Yale University. Dr. Meltzer has been President of the American College of Neuropsychopharmacology (ACNP) and the Collegium International Neuropsychopharmacologicum (CINP). He served as editor of *Psychopharmacology: The Third Generation of Progress* and co-editor of the ACNP journal, *Neuropsychopharmacology*, and is currently a member of the editorial board of numerous scientific journals.

Dr. Meltzer is the recipient of the Efron and Paul Hoch Awards of the ACNP, the Noyes Prize of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the Edward J. Sachar Award from Columbia University, the Lieber Prize for Schizophrenia Research from NARSAD, the Stanley Dean Award for Research in Schizophrenia of the American College of Psychiatry, the Gold Medal Award of the Society of Biological Psychiatry, the Earl Sutherland Prize for Achievement in Research of Vanderbilt University (2004), the Research Prize of the American Psychiatric Association (2005) and the Grant Liddle Award for Clinical Research from Vanderbilt University (2008).

His research interests include: clinical and basic psychopharmacology, with an emphasis on antipsychotic drug efficacy, safety and tolerability; the mechanism of action of antipsychotic drugs; genetic factors in schizophrenia and pharmacogenomics; prevention of suicide in schizophrenia and cognitive impairment in schizophrenia.
